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AAPCHO Commends President Biden's New Public Charge Ruling

WASHINGTON – The Association of Asian Pacific Community Health Organizations (AAPCHO) issued the following statement on the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's new <u>public charge rule</u>. The new final rule released by the Biden administration today rolls back discriminatory provisions issued during the Trump administration and sets new federal public charge regulations in line with longstanding immigration laws and policies. This new rule ensures that use of federal health care benefits like Medicaid will not be used to deny any immigrant the ability to get a green card or entry to the United States.

Jeffrey B. Caballero, AAPCHO's executive director, said:

"AAPCHO is heartened by the Biden administration's new public charge rule. Immigrants and their families, especially Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders can be assured that they can seek the health care they need.

"AAPCHO and our member community health centers continue to fight for immigrants' rights and undo the deep fear and hesitancy in the communities our members serve. Many of our health center members saw a steep decline in patients seeking care because of the Trump rule, which has worsened during the pandemic. We hope this new public charge rule will help immigrants and their families confidently seek the health care they need without jeopardizing their immigration status.

"The Biden rule is a positive step forward and will lead to healthier communities. AAPCHO is committed to working with the administration, our members, and our community partners to educate patients of their rights under this new rule, and ultimately removing discriminatory public charge provisions from federal law entirely."
