- Includes a Practice Research Manager, access to SIU's IRB, medical library, research and statistical support and training
- Created a Statement of Community Values for Research

Why Research is Important to SIHF...

- Improvements in patient care lay undiscovered within the clinical setting...awaits discovery by those who need it most...practicing clinician
- Next step in improving quality and health outcomes for our patients
- Can improve clinicians knowledge of specific problems they see in their practices
- Adds a level of inquiry to clinician practice; a slightly different thought process

Why Research is Important to SIHF....

- Can help clinicians and patients to change behaviors and make more informed choices
- Reorganize and coordinate delivery of care
- Strengthen the physician-patient relationship
- Promote recruitment and retention
- Adds value to the CHC's mission
- Provides opportunity for diverse underserved patients to be heard

How Do You Get Started?

- Start Internally
 - Assess Clinician's interest
 - Identify an Internal Champion or Team of Champions
 - Support of Medical Director is critical
 - Support of the Board is critical
 - Seek a compatible academic partner
 - Other tasks...

Challenges

- Research adds cost
- Research requires clinician, staff, administrative and board member time and effort
- Research adds to the existing paperwork burden for patients and personnel
- Confidentiality concerns
- Sustainability requires careful planning

Surprises

- Funding is different
- Requirements for research grant applications are very different
- Research and PBRN Infrastructure funding sources are scarce
- Investigator driven

Current Focus

- Develop trust and respect between two organizations that are committed to establishing best practices for the conduct of research in the PBRN
- Building research capacity for the PBRN
 - developing/seeking new research projects
 - several pending grant submissions
 - building collaborative research teams

Current Focus

- Research prioritization
 - gather and utilize data from SIHF practices, patient demographics, key health concerns and quality indicators
- Testing strategies for involving the community in the research process

Building Collaborative Research Teams

- Pilot project Impact SIPRO's future development
- Prepare collaborative teams of clinicians for their roles as "community-based clinical investigators"
- Developing teams that are mutually accountable and respectful of one another's contributions to the programs goals
